



Swedish artist presents his work on 31 October, when the international art exhibition " opens.

The objective is to help the public and politicians at the UN Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen understand the complicated aspects of climate change. In 2010 RETHINK will tour in the Nordic countries.

Henrik Håkansson taped the sounds of the jungle during his stay in Mexico. The artwork "Atmosphere" combines these sounds and projected colours, surrounding the audience with a taste of the jungle Selva Lacandona. With "Atmosphere", Håkansson comments on how people engage with nature. Humans often depend on technological devices to understand nature in the first place - and this factor decides how we treat the world and nature.
